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1.0 INTRODUCTION

In November 2022, Radius reopened the Community Chest Grant funding programme which has been successfully running for four years. Funding is available for tenants, service users, clients and small groups and organisations working within Radius Communities.

1.1 Aims & Objectives

The below objectives were agreed that a project must deliver on at least one of the following outcomes:

- 1. It will support a community development and or empowerment project.
- 2. It will support groups to carry out local sustainability projects particularly around identified issues such as waste management, litter, dog fouling, environmental issues and energy efficiency.
- 3. It will support the development of digital and financial Inclusion projects with vulnerable groups or individuals.
- 4. It will support local people into Education, Learning and Volunteering opportunities.
- 5. It will deliver targeted health and wellbeing outcomes to vulnerable groups or individuals.
- 6. This year we will also be particularly keen to fund projects which propose a creative approach to support communities to collectively address areas of deprivation and need in the current financial climate. However, we **will not** fund the direct provision of money, vouchers or food.

Essential Criteria

- 1. The project is in a community where Radius is represented.
- 2. The application must demonstrate demand for the project in the local community and consultation with residents.
- 3. Projects must be inclusive and accessible to all.
- 4. Project can show that value for money will be achieved.
- 5. Project must be delivered within 12 months of award.

Applications

- Radius received 33 applications in total.
- 30 projects were successful awarding a total of £19,972.51
- 2 projects moved to our Community Empowerment Funding.
- 1 application was declined due to not meeting our funding criteria.

2.0 OUTCOMES


All successful applicants are required to submit an evaluation form on completion of their project. This establishes how the funding received supported their projects with 23 projects already completed and the remaining 7 projects to take place in the Autumn time.

2.1 Overall Impact

The Community Chest funding supported:

- 630 participants were involved in various projects.
- 74% of all participants involved were aged over 55 with 24% reaching all other age groups
- involved 82 volunteers
- involved 15 members of staff in their organisations
- worked in partnership with 10 agencies to include Men's Shed, BHSCT, EANI and Alternatives NI
- reached a wide geographical area in both rural and urban areas as shown in the below map on page 5.
- Two CAT 1 schemes and Floating Support Newtownabbey applied and successfully received funding which shows the partnership work between Floating Support and the Community Investment Team.
- Three Housing with Care projects applied to Community Chest and received funding from the Community Chest Fund or Community Empowerment Fund, showed the partnership working between Care Services and the Community Investment Team to ensure the projects were funded.

2.2 Themes required to deliver project

As part of the projects delivered within communities, groups had to meet at least one of our themes to deliver their project. All groups received funding to support health and wellbeing projects to our most vulnerable in society. Many of the groups also met one or more of the other themes required:

- 11 groups funded supported a community to be empowered.
- 2 groups funded supported local people with education, learning and volunteering opportunities.
- 10 groups funded supported groups to carry out a sustainable project within the community.
- 2 groups funded a digital inclusion project with vulnerable groups or individuals
- 19 groups supported health and wellbeing outcomes to vulnerable groups or individuals.

2.3 Inclusion and Good Relations

As part of the evaluation process, we wanted to know if the projects we funded supported the inclusion of participants protected under the section 75 group and the promotion of good relations

a. Inclusion of participants

100% of groups were inclusive, ensuring that the projects they delivered included:

- persons of different religious belief, political opinion, racial group, age, marital status or sexual orientation
- men and women generally
- persons with a disability

b. Good Relations

We asked groups if the project promoted good relations between persons of different religious belief, political opinion or racial groups:

- 83% of groups promoted involvement of different religious belief and political opinion.
- 17% of groups promoted good relations between different racial groups.

2.4 Spending outcomes

We asked all groups if funding received was spent as anticipated. All groups that have completed their projects have spent all their funding. The condition is that groups have their funding spent and projects completed within 12 months of receiving the funding.

Unanticipated Outcomes

There have been unanticipated outcomes which have benefited groups and the participants involved in projects.

a. Reducing isolation and loneliness

Projects have supported participants to come together which has helped reduce loneliness and isolation. Friendships have formed between tenants who have been living within the scheme for many years and tenants who recently moved in especially with more male tenants getting involved in the projects which are a particularly hard group to get involved in projects.

b. Continued involvement

When the funded project ended a number of tenants have continued to meet regularly and participate in their own art classes which will have long term benefits.

c. Health & Wellbeing

Supporting participants with health and wellbeing has helped improve the stigma attached to mental health conditions enabling participants to talk openly about their feelings.

d. Building relationships

Tenant Engagement attended a meeting at Forthriver Fold with tenants who were unhappy with Radius Housing and the lack of funding opportunities in their local area. Tenant Engagement explained the opportunity for the group of tenants to collectively apply for Community Chest funding. Resulting in the group applying for funding with the support of their Housing Officer and successfully receive a grant for their chosen project. This has helped build relations between tenants and Radius.

3.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

3.1 Administration

For items that have been purchased online it is important that groups ensure all items ordered have been delivered as per the invoice and that items are in working order. This will ensure if there are any items missing or broken the Tenant Engagement Team can make contact with the company to reorder or ask for a refund within the timeframe allocated.

A recommendation from last year was to hold an information session online to support groups applying for Community Chest funding. This year the Tenant Engagement team offered 3 Community Chest Information sessions in the morning, afternoon, and evening time to accommodate all attendees which included groups within the local community, as well as some Radius Staff members. The information sessions included an overview of the Community Chest Application form and what applicants should include, some helpful tips and hints, followed by a question-and-answer round to allow participants the chance to voice any concerns or ideas when applying. These information sessions were proven to be successful having had a total of 13 participants who attended the sessions found them beneficial when applying for Community Chest funding and we will continue to run them every year.

4.0 CONCLUSION

The Community Chest Fund continues to have a positive impact in communities across Northern Ireland ensuring tenants, service users, clients and small groups working within Radius have an opportunity to able to apply for funding from £250-£1000.
